Where these dates come from

All 50 dated closures are drawn from the instrument itself — the gazette, statute or order — retrieved and read, across 5 named sources. Of these, all 33 regional and municipal closures are drawn from the instrument itself. Every row names its own source in the tables that follow, and a row that gains an instrument says so in *What changed*.

Busiest by total closures, national and subdivision together: **January 2028** 10 · **January 2027** 6 · **February 2027** 6. The longest stretch carrying **no national closure** runs **121 days**, 26 June 2027 to 24 October 2027 — a subdivision may still close inside it.

Reckoned on: By decree, Gregorian, Gregorian computus (Western). A date **set by decree** is announced rather than computed, so it cannot appear until it is announced.

Questions this dossier answers

When does the country stop, which subdivisions keep their own calendar, which dates are not yet fixed, which months are dense and which runs are clear? Each has a section, and they can be read in any order.

What changed tells you whether anything moved since last month — if nothing did, it says so plainly. **At a glance** is the whole jurisdiction in one page of counts. **The next 18 months** summarises the window — what is coming next, where the closures cluster and where the clear runs are — without repeating a single date from the tables. After that the dossier goes layer by layer: the national calendar, then each subdivision that keeps its own dates, then religious observance, markets and filings.

Provenance, near the back, names every source and the date it was retrieved. It is the section worth checking first if you are deciding whether to trust the rest.

WHY THERE IS A NEW EDITION EVERY MONTH

Calendars drift. Governments revise dates, markets announce closures, religious authorities confirm observances after sighting, and subdivisions change their own

rules. This edition is a statement of what is known on the day it was compiled, and it is rebuilt every month for that reason — an edition is a position, not a publication.

WHAT IT IS NOT

It is not a forecast and it is not advice. Dates that depend on a sighting or a government announcement are marked, and they can move after this edition is published.

How this document works

Why it is republished every month

Holiday law changes. Governments announce substitute days, move a national day, or cancel one outright, and they rarely do it a year ahead. A calendar published once a year is therefore wrong for part of the year and gives no sign of it. So this dossier is compiled fresh every month from the underlying corpus and reissued — 12 editions a year, each superseding the last.

Every edition covers a rolling eighteen months from its own month. Edition 2026.10 covers the eighteen months beginning that month, not a calendar year, so an edition opened in November is worth exactly as much as one opened in January.

Found something wrong? Tell us.

A wrong date is not the real failure — reprinting it for a year is. If a date here does not match what your own office observes, or the source we name is not the one you would cite, write to u@1752.io with the country and the date. Corrections go into the next edition, which is never more than a month away, and appear under *What changed* so you can see they landed.

WHAT A STANDING ORDER GETS YOU

The newest edition, every month, for as long as it runs. A dossier bought once carries twelve months of editions and then stops at whichever edition was current when it lapsed — that edition stays yours permanently. Nobody is ever downgraded to an older edition than the one they last had a right to.

WHERE THE DATES COME FROM

Every row is either computed from a published rule or carried from an official notice, and each row states which. Nothing is asserted without an underlying rule or source. Every row carries an evidence tier, printed beside it rather than claimed in the preface. The tier says what the row rests on, not how confident we feel:

■ Authority-sourced

The instrument itself was retrieved and read — a gazette, a statute, a ministerial order — and it is named in Provenance.

▣ Multiple

sources	Two or more independent sources state the same thing, none of them the instrument.
☒ Single official source	One official document names it, without a second to agree with it.
☐ Secondary source	A calendar reference rather than the instrument. A real source, and not the law.

Tier 1 outranks Tier 2 while naming fewer sources, and the reason is worth stating: the gazette is the instrument. A university, a law firm and three newspapers reporting a holiday are legitimate and are still not the document that created it.

We publish the spread for exactly this reason: a jurisdiction where most rows sit at Tier 4 is a jurisdiction where the published law was hard to reach, and you should know that before you rely on it, not afterwards.

METHODOLOGY

The full methodology — the assurance ladder, what counts as a primary source for each kind of date, and how substitution rules are modelled — is published at 1752.io/methodology. The same data is available through the Calendar API if you would rather compute against it than read it.



What changed

Compared against edition 2026-10. Only the dated rows are compared; wording and layout changes are not listed.

Nothing changed this month. Every date, rule and source in this dossier is identical to the previous edition. That is a result, not an omission — it is stated so that a reader never has to diff two PDFs to find out.

Document control

This dossier is generated from a structured corpus rather than authored as prose. Every row is computed from a rule or carried from an official notice, and every row names the source it rests on — nothing is asserted here without a rule or a source behind it.

- national — the whole country stops
- subdivision only — somewhere in it stops
- unused, scaled to the busiest month

A month with a long light bar is busy *somewhere*, not everywhere. The number on the right reads national first, then the subdivision count after the plus.



Busiest month **January 2028** (2 national, 8 subdivision); quietest **May 2027** (0 national, 0 subdivision). The longest run with **nothing closed nationally** is 122 days, 2027-06-25 to 2027-10-25.

Every calendar in this dossier laid over the full eighteen months. A day carrying something is tinted and marked; the mark says which calendar. Weekends are greyed. This is for seeing the shape of the window — where the clusters and the clear runs are; the tables above are for looking a date up.

The colours are labels, not symbols. They are assigned in order of size from a colourblind-safe sequence and carry no meaning of their own — no colour here is intended to represent any tradition. Each mark has a distinct shape as well, so the sheet reads the same in greyscale. A day may carry more than one mark, and a mark means a calendar has an entry that day, not that everything closes.

School terms and breaks

The school year as the education authority publishes it. A school break closes no office and it empties one anyway — attendance, travel demand and the availability of anyone with children all move with it.

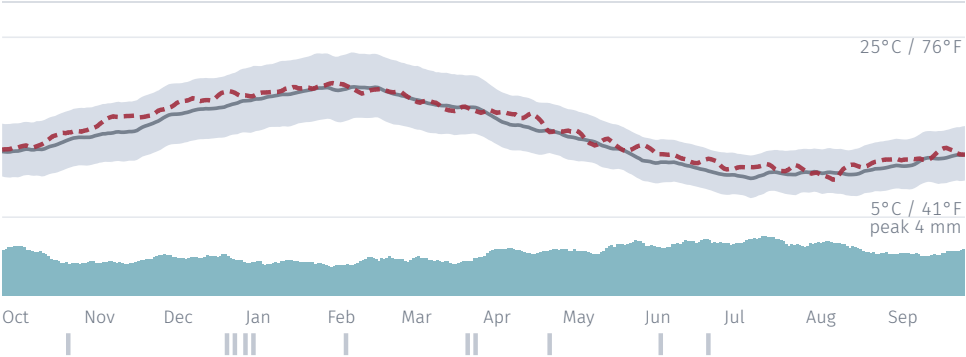

Seasonal rhythm

The typical shape of a year in New Zealand, computed from **58 weather stations and grid points** across the country.

Why this matters. A date on its own tells you an office is shut. It does not tell you whether that closure falls in the wet season, the dark months or the hot ones — which is what decides whether a launch, a site visit, an outdoor event or a shipping route is affected by more than the closure itself. This page is the backdrop the calendar sits in. It is context, not a factor in the dates.

What this is, and what it is not

This is a record, not a prediction. Every value is an average of weather that actually happened, on that day of the year, across 58 points. It says what is *typical*. It does not say what will happen, and no day in it is a forecast.

A country is not a climate. Averaging New Zealand into one line flattens real differences — mountains against coast, north against south — so this page is a **rhythm**: the shape of the seasons, the position of the wet months, the run of the hot ones. Where a subdivision keeps its own dates it also gets its own chart on the pages that follow, which is where the differences show.

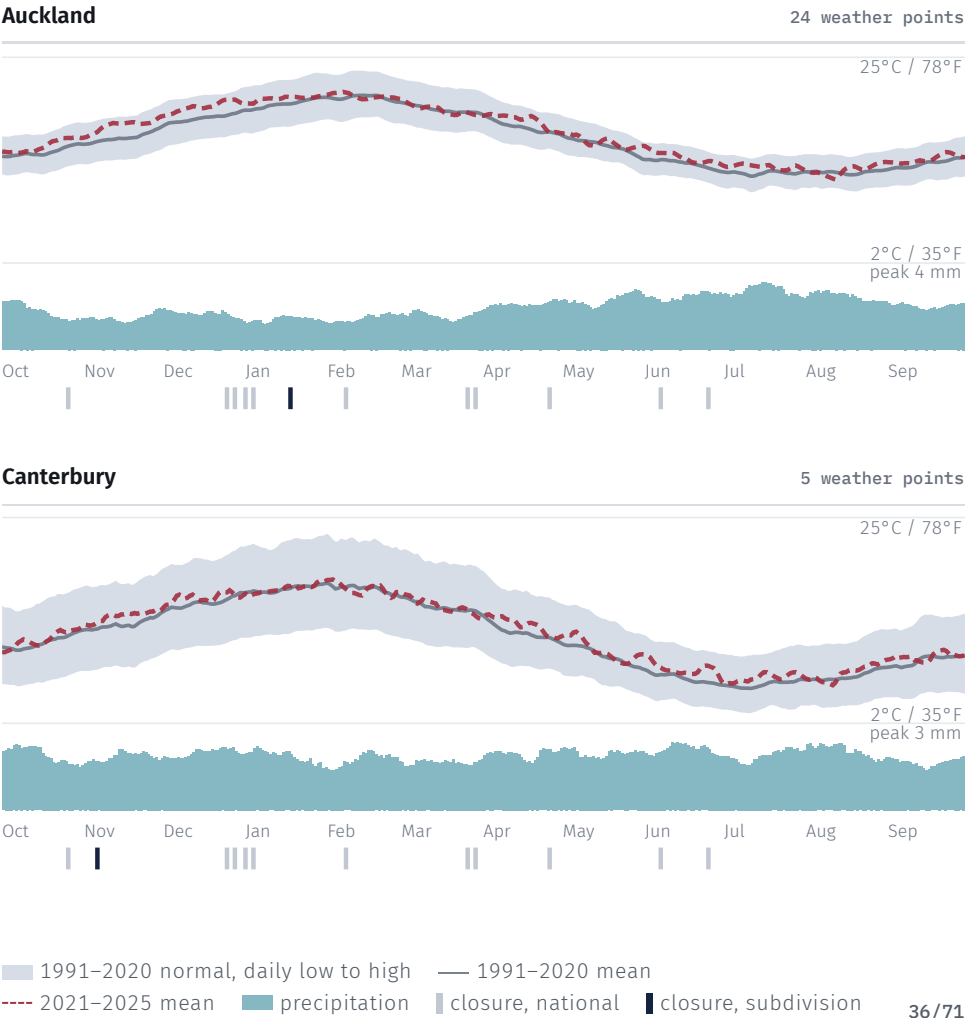
Both lines are the **daily mean temperature**, so the gap between them is the shift. Twelve months, not eighteen: a normal repeats yearly. The 2021–2025 mean is five years deep — enough for a shift in the mean, not for anything about extremes. Source: Open-Meteo historical reanalysis, daily records from 1981.

Seasonal rhythm — subdivisions

The same twelve months, for every subdivision that keeps dates of its own and has weather records behind it. **One temperature scale across every chart**, so they can honestly be read against one another: a band sitting higher is a hotter place, a taller band a wider daily swing, a later teal mass a later wet season. Each chart is labelled with its own top and bottom values.

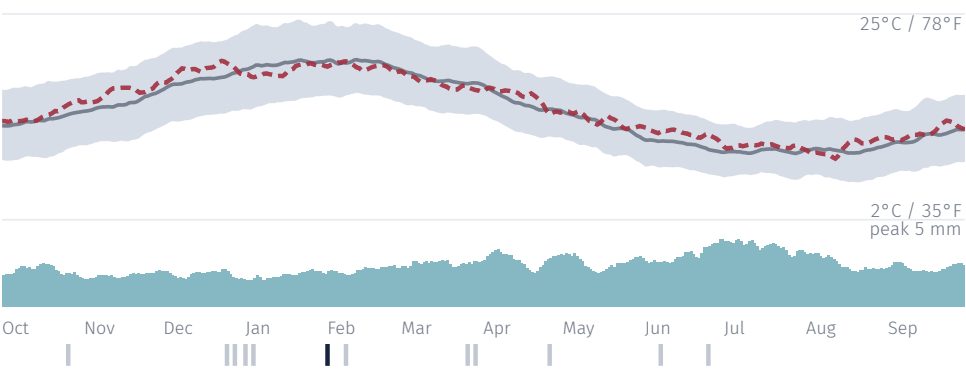
A weather point is one location with a daily record behind it — a station or a reanalysis grid cell. The count under each name says how many were averaged to draw that chart, and it is worth reading: a subdivision averaged from two hundred points describes a region, one drawn from a single point describes that point.

Figure 2 · The weather year by subdivision



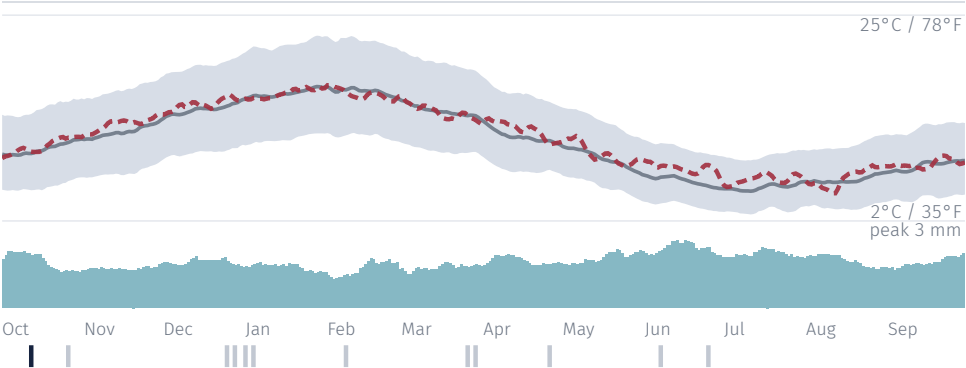

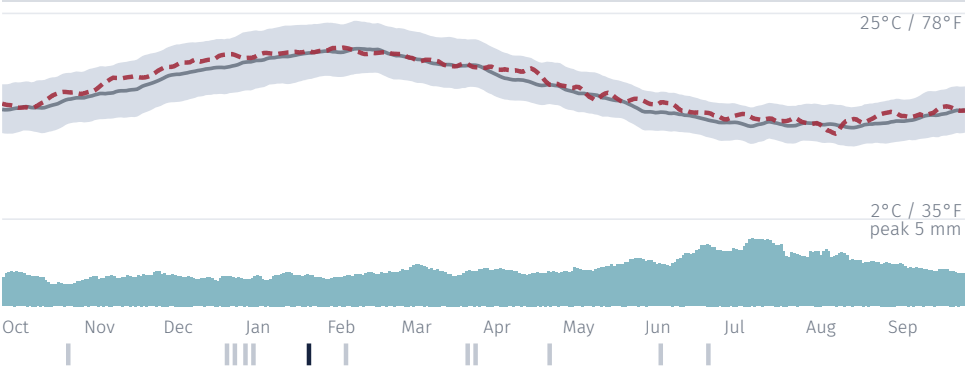

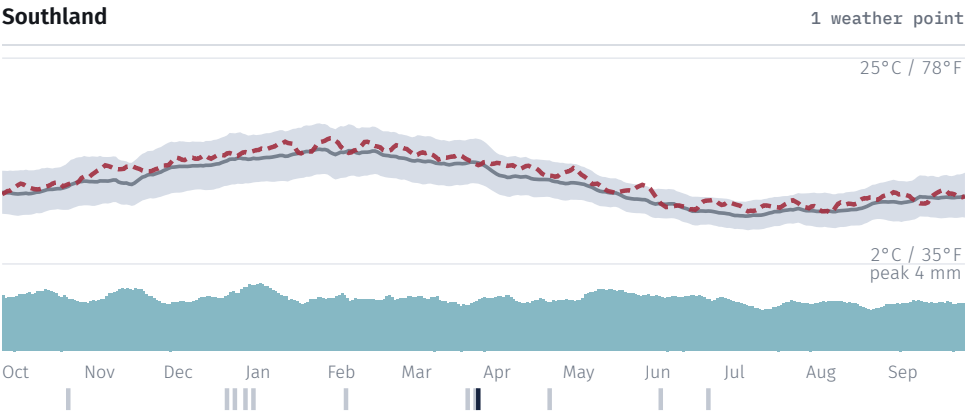
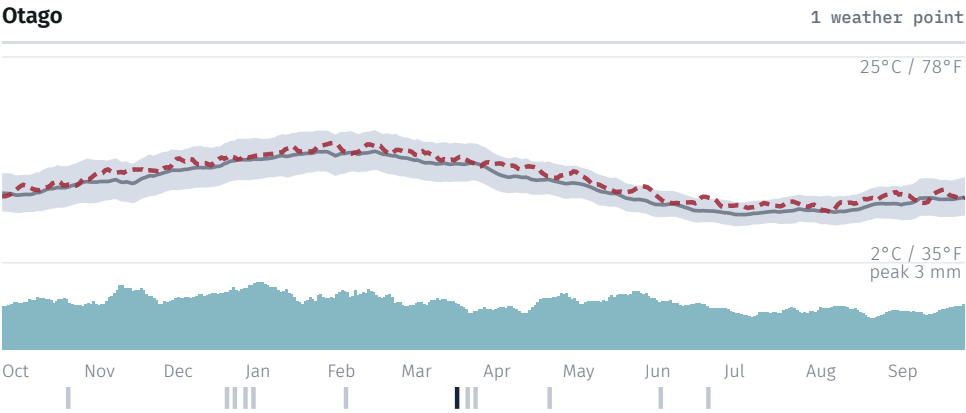

National closures only, across the whole window. Given so that a reader whose week is not Monday-to-Friday can work out their own figure — a Sunday-to-Thursday operation loses nothing to a Friday closure

and everything to a Sunday one, and no single column above can say that for them.



0 of 17 national closures fall on a Saturday or Sunday, so a Monday-to-Friday operation loses **17** of them and a seven-day operation loses all 17. That gap is the single largest reason two companies in the same country count their year differently.

WHERE A SUBDIVISION DIFFERS

Under a five-day week, against the national figure in the table above. A subdivision can only ever have *fewer* working days than the country as a whole — it keeps every national closure and adds its own — so every figure here is a subtraction. A month is named once when it costs one day, and carries a figure when it costs more.

Both are given separately because an instruction that misses a value date costs something and a closed shop does not.

No day in this window closes banks without also closing everything else. Where that is so, the general closure list is the settlement list.

What this section does not yet cover. Payment systems are not modelled: TARGET2, CHAPS, Fedwire, CHIPS and SEPA keep their own calendars, and a euro instruction can fail on a day no country in the euro area treats as a holiday. The pattern

Twelve months, every subdivision that keeps dates of its own, in alphabetical order. Nothing is named here — the tables do that. This page answers a different question: **when do the closures fall, and how much of the calendar is shared?**

Dark ticks are that row's own dates. Pale ticks are the national days, repeated on every row, so the share of a subdivision's year that is simply the country's can be read directly. Ticks overlap where dates cluster; that density is the point.

The pattern nearby

The same twelve months for every jurisdiction in **Australia and New Zealand**, the region containing New Zealand. National closures only, no dates named, nothing but the shape.

This page answers what a single-country document cannot: when the whole region stops at once, and when it is collectively clear. Grouping is geographic and carries no other meaning.

Every future date is a **draft**. Elections are announced, not enacted — dates move, polls are postponed, and results are occasionally annulled and re-run. Hollow marks are announced; dashed marks are dates the source itself will not confirm.

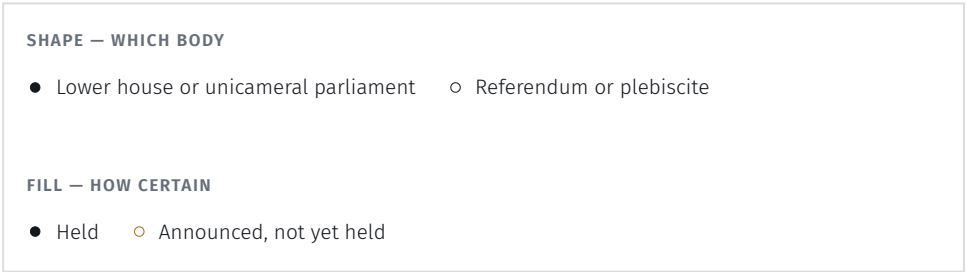
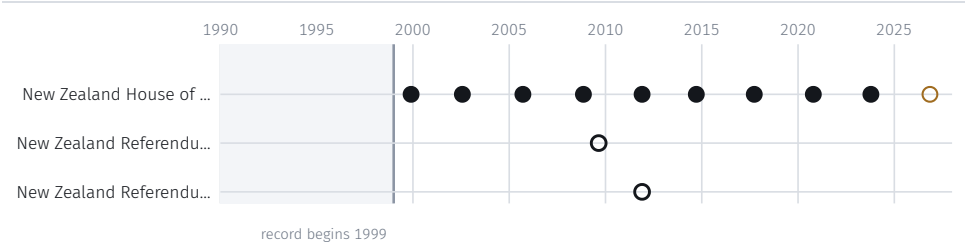


Figure 5 · Every contest on record, by body

Operating conditions

When this market is predictably full rather than predictably shut.

Nothing on this page closes anything. A closure is a legal fact and lives in the tables earlier in this dossier. A condition is not: the offices are open, the banks are open, and the beds, the roads and the trains are full. Where a condition coincides with a public holiday the two are recorded separately, in separate layers, because they are two different facts about the same day and only one of them is the law.

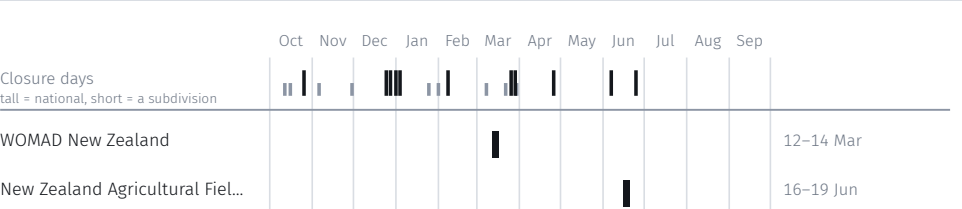
How this section is sourced, and why it differs. 3 of 8 conditions here have been checked against an authority that publishes the strain itself. The other 5 are compiled: the fact is recorded and its source named, but no instrument was retrieved to confirm it. The closure record in this dossier rests on gazettes, statutes and government notices, which are published once and archived. Conditions rest on a different set of authorities — a transport operator’s service notice, a city’s event permit, a police traffic plan — and those are typically published for one weekend and taken down.

Expect the operating conditions section to receive more frequent updates than the rest of the dossier. Coverage is still being added, and a date announced by an organiser replaces an estimate the month it is announced. The closure record changes when a law changes; this changes whenever anyone publishes anything.

8 conditions recorded for this market: 8 hosted here. **2** are dated inside this eighteen-month window; the rest recur but are not yet placed. The record behind them runs from **2025** to **2027**, 5 dated editions in all.

The year, and what fills it

The rest of this dossier answers *is it open*. This is the one page that answers it beside *and can I get to it*, on the same twelve months. A bar over an empty stretch of the closure lane is the case worth finding: nothing is shut, and nothing is available either. What each one strains, and how hard, is set out condition by condition below.

RECURRING CONDITIONS AND WHEN THEY USUALLY FALL

These recur in this market on a known rhythm, without a confirmed date inside the published window — either the organiser has not announced it yet, or the only date available rested on a compilation, and a forward date is held to a higher bar than that. **A window shown in figures is empirical, not a forecast:** it is where the start date has actually fallen across the editions on record. A window shown in words is the source’s own statement of when the thing happens.

Past editions are compiled from published summaries, and the trade is deliberate: a past date that is wrong misleads nobody, a future one books a hotel in the wrong fortnight — so forward dates are held to the instrument and these are not. The record is not guaranteed complete either, so read the edition count as the strength of the statement rather than as a total.

This is the *conditions* layer: supporting context, never the primary answer. Conditions are graded on the same ladder as the closure record and most sit below it, because the authority for a capacity claim is the party that has to absorb the event — a transport operator, a city, a statistics office — and those are harder to retrieve than a gazette. Each band above says what it rests on.

Provenance

Every source behind this dossier, named and dated. This is the section nobody else prints: a list of dates is worth what its evidence is worth, and the evidence is here rather than on request.

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What this dossier reports

We report what was published and reachable at the time this edition was compiled. Where a government had not yet announced a date, or where the instrument setting it could not be retrieved, the dossier says so in the row rather than filling the gap with an assumption.

SCOPE OF MONITORING

1752 continuously monitors **241 countries and territories** across **653 subdivisions** — 510 of which keep a date their country does not — together with 57 market venues, drawing on 1032 registered sources. The whole catalogue is recompiled and republished every month. **A month in which nothing changed is a normal result**, and this dossier states it explicitly in *What changed* rather than leaving you to compare two documents to find out.

LIMITATIONS

- Dates that depend on a lunar sighting or a discretionary government announcement are marked as estimates and may move after publication.
- Assurance grades describe the evidence behind a row at the time of compilation, not a guarantee of future accuracy.
- Subdivision coverage reflects jurisdictions that publish their own calendars. A subdivision with no separate entry follows the national calendar.
- Market sessions and settlement conventions are modelled from published rulebooks and are not a substitute for the venue's own notices.
